This course is Intended primarily for students with no previous knowledge of Ukrainian; yet it will be beneficial to 'home speakers' of Ukrainian or some other Slavic language - Russian, Belorussian, Polish, etc. (these languages have much in common with Ukrainian). What we'll achieve

The most important outcome of the course is growth – not only in Ukrainian language proficiency, but also in the ability to feel the beauty of a new language and the culture of people who speak it, in being open and impressionable, sensitive to one another and the world around. We also will:

- learn to speak and write in Ukrainian about family, friends, studies, interests and leisure, opinions and attitudes;
- acquire language skills to communicate with speakers of Ukrainian in such situations as greetings, introductions, requests for information, descriptions of people, expression of ownership, giving instructions, asking and answering questions;
- come to comprehend and enjoy fundamental spoken and written Ukrainian;
- learn many interesting things about Ukrainian culture;
- get to know the **rich dimensions of human diversity** characteristic of Slavic cultures, including but not limited to linguistic, ethnic, social, regional, gender and ability difference;
- enhance the understanding of our own languages and cultural backgrounds;
- come to know **how to learn a language** which is quite different from Germanic or Romanic languages.


There's nothing to fear in language learning. Don't be afraid to make mistakes, this may stop you from communicating. Mistakes are beautiful, they just show us the area in which we need to improve.

Learning Ukrainian gives your voice, intellect, identity, emotions, and culture a new dimension, but it takes a bit of time and patience. Please be gentle with yourself and others. Let me know if you're ever feeling like you need some encouragement!

What about grading?

Marking and assessment in UBC Ukrainian classes are designed to encourage your progress and to coach you toward your goals.

Here's how we do it.



Attendance and participation (10%)

According to the UBC Academic Calendar, "regular attendance is expected of students in all their classes". If you miss a class for whatever reason, read the material in the textbook, complete all the activities that your classmates have done in class, do the home assignments, record the results of your work (either in the audio or written format, as appropriate) and submit them to Canvas in the Attendance section within five working days after you come back to class. Follow this link: How to submit an online assignment.

Home assignments (10%)

Home assignments are mandatory; they can be in the written or oral form. They are to be submitted as a word file or as an mp3/mp4 file via Canvas before each class. Home assignments have the pass/fail value, which means that a student will get 'a pass' for each assignment submitted timely and at least 70% of it is right. After the due date, home assignments can be submitted only with the instructor's agreement. No home assignment will be accepted after the last class of the term (2023.12.07 and 2024.04.11) respectively.

Reading check-ins (5%x4=20%)

There will be four reading check-ins (two each term). They will be of two types – oral and written. For the oral reading check-in, you will be asked to record your reading of a text or poem of your choice (1.5 – 2 min long). The written assignment (150-200 words long) will deal with a cultural text of your choice. The following information is to be included into it: the name of the author; the title, the dateline (or URL), pages read, a short summary of what you read, your general opinion (whether you like it or not and why). These assignments will be done at home and submitted via Canvas. Your instructor might ask you to read aloud in class what you have written (thus ChatGPT should be used with caution – if at all!). Late submissions should be agreed with the instructor, and they are evaluated according to the 80% scale.

Online quizzes (2%x10=20%)

Online quizzes are posted on Canvas. The online component accompanies the textbook, complementing and reinforcing the material covered in class. The online quizzes can be completed at students' own pace; however, those submitted after the due date receive 80% of the grade. No online quizzes will be accepted after the end of classes (2023.12.07 – the first term; 2024.04.11 – the second term).

Tests (10%x2=20%)

There will be two written tests (one at the end of each term) that will enable you to assess what you know and what you do not know. They will cover grammar and vocabulary that was practiced in class and in 10-minute online quizzes, but the tests will be longer, taking 20 minutes. Details of each test will be announced a week before the test date.

Portfolio (20%)

The portfolio is an ongoing document for your personal exploration with Ukrainian language and culture. You will submit your contributions two times in the semester and grade your progress yourself. There will be two types of documents in your portfolio: 1) a language passport, which provides self-evaluation of your Ukrainian proficiency at a given point in time (you can find CEFFR Self-assessment grid at <a href="https://rm.coe.int/coerm/c
