# **Course Description**

This course is focused on concepts of "nation-building" in central, eastern and northern Europe in relation to discourses of politicial Emancipation, Enlightenment, as well as Orientalism. It falls into three modules:

- 1. **Gender and Nation in Canada and Europe**, comparing stories of adolescence and belonging in Canada and Europe, and studying revolutionary poetry.
- 2. **Gender Race Religion: Enlightenment / Orientalism**, focusing on historical plots of crusades, colonialism, slavery and gender, in dramatic renderings.
- 3. **Gender Nation Education: Naturalism / Avant-Garde**, focusing on two dramas on military definitions of "nation-states" and the role of officers' daughters.

This course has no prerequisites. It is taught in English and all relevant material studied will be provided in English translation. This class is taught in-person. Some assignments and exams may be online.
