This course discusses Europe from a decentred point of view. Its goal is to question where Europe begins, ends, and where its centre could be located, culturally and geographically. We critically review hierarchies of power in a short story by Franz Kafka, the colonial context of European identity by reading a fairy tale by Danish author Hans Christian Andersen, discuss how Germany dealt with the Holocaust after 1945 (Bernhard Schlink: *The Reader*), and look at Europe from the East by focusing on post-communist Europe and the 'Balkan' region (Slavenka Drakulić: *Café Europa Revisited*). We will also study journalistic writings and documentaries that deal with the EU extension in 2004.

The course is taught online, with the class meeting on Zoom every Tuesday, 11-12:20 PST.
