This course focuses on narratives of belonging from a transdisciplinary cultural studies perspective. How do people relate to place? Does the question "Where are you from?" assume a linear narrative and sedentarist perspective of exclusion? How do we narratively create and perform collective belonging, cultural spaces, phenomenological borders, national and ethnic identities? With an emphasis on contemporary postmigrant narratives from German-language literature that have become central to Germany as a plural society, as well as to European social studies, we will investigate counter-narratives to Eurocentric, ethnically and nationally centred visions of identity and belonging. The course is taught in a hybrid format, with the class meeting in person every Tuesday.
