# ORHDP's First Digitization Trips: Peachland, O'Keefe Ranch and Summerland

We are very pleased to announce that Phase 1 of the Okanagan Region Historical Digitization Project is well underway. The Graduate and Undergraduate Project Assistants have been trained and were ready (and excited!) to embark on their first site visit to Peachland Museum the week of May 23<sup>rd</sup>-26<sup>th</sup>. The site visit was a success, with over 600 items scanned during our 3.5 day visit!

The month of June was a busy one for the team, between working on the post-production for the Peachland scans, digitizing magic lantern slides at the Historic O'Keefe Ranch, and doing digitization work at the Summerland Museum. We have a busy month ahead as well, with visits planned for Armstrong, Keremeos and Osoyoos.

### What We Are Using: ORHDP's Technology Profiles

Dell Laptops

Epson Scanners

XcaneX Book Scanner

Audio Cassette Converter

We have acquired two Dell Precision 7710 laptops for our project. Both laptops are equipped with Adobe Photoshop, which we are using to lightly edit our scans prior to uploading them online.

We have also acquired two Epson Perfection V800 Photo scanners to take with us on our site visits. These machines take high-quality scans of loose sheets of paper, photographs, film, and negatives.

The XcaneX Book Scanner was purchased in order to be able to scan bound volumes, which would be more difficult to scan with the Epson scanners. Its height is adjustable, so it is able to scan many sizes of bound texts.

The Ion Tape Express Plus Tape-to-Digital Converter & Player will allow us to convert audio cassettes to a digital format. It plays both chrome and normal tapes and works both using batteries as well as through USB.
