ABOUT BECAUSE IT LASTS

From ancient epic tales like *Beowulf, The Odyssey,* and *The Epic of Gilgamesh,* where young men adventure through foreign lands, to recent youth movie adaptations featuring time or space travel like *Miss Peregrine's Home for Peculiar Children, Ender's Game,* and Marvel's *Endgame,* themes of time and space have long been part of children's and young adult literature and media.

As the Covid-19 pandemic has frustrated our senses of time and space in recent years, these themes have only become more relevant. In times when unprecedented levels of migration and ease of mobility led many to believe that the world did not have many barriers, such a prolonged global confinement has led to increased feelings of loneliness, disorientation, and powerlessness. This, combined with a sense of losing time—or at least, track of it—will have repercussions on both old and new generations. As we aim to make sense of our lives and situations, this conference will explore theories of time and space—to help us comprehend the incomprehensible.

This three-day Biennial Graduate Student Research Conference in Children's Literature marks the ninth time that students from the Master of Arts in Children's Literature Program at UBC's iSchool collaborate to host a children's literature conference. The event strives to reflect the multidisciplinary nature of the program-jointly offered by the School of Information (iSchool), the School of Creative Writing, the Department of Language and Literacy Education, and the Department of English Language and Literatures—addressing the full lifecycle of works from conception and publication to dissemination and criticism. KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



JUSTYNA DESZCZ-TRYHUBCZAK

"Spacetimematterings of the Child and Childhood in the Anthropocene: Research Orientations in Children's Literature and Culture Studies"

In this presentation, I reflect on how the Anthropocene, a new geological epoch in which humans have become the single most significant force shaping the future of our planet, challenges us to interrogate and reframe conventional conceptualizations of being human, including the linearity of the child's path towards adulthood. This is so as the Anthropocene drastically reorganizes our experience of time: it brings together human life, vast geological times, and the future that has already been foreclosed in the face of climate emergency and the loss of biodiversity (Vermuelen 2020). It has also made us aware of the complexity of spaces/places in which we live as produced by relations with multiple human and nonhuman others that inhabit them as well (Malone and Nxumalo 2022). I argue that these disorientations should encourage us to search for create inventive research practices and tools that will enable us to address multiple entanglements of the child and texts of culture. I suggest that we do so through experimentation with post-qualitative, new materialist, and posthumanist approaches and concepts, including spacetimemattering, (Barad 2007), noticing (Tsing 2014), worlding (Haraway 2008), and after

childhood (Kraftl 2020). I conclude with examples of such a practice in my own inquiries.

Justyna Deszcz-Tryhubczak is an Associate
Professor of Literature and Director of the
Center for Young People's Literature and
Culture at the Institute of English Studies,
University of Wroclaw, Poland. She has published on child-led research, utopianism, and
new materialism. In 2017-2021, she served on
the board of the International Research Society
for Children's Literature.

"Writing into the Future"

Writing for children is inherently a journey through time and space. We write for small people who will become the big people of the future. With our words, we can expand their perspectives and defy their expectations. Tanya lives in Vancouver, B.C., where she's a lecturer for the UBC School of Creative Writing. Tanya just published in May 2022 a new informational picturebook with her teen daughter Julia, Better Connected, how girls are using social media for good, a book about how girls use Internet to bring about positive changes.
