## English 222 – 001 – Literature in Canada Contemporary Canadian Fiction on the Margins

This section of English 222 will explore some of the diversity of recent Canadian writing through the study of four novels, a short story collection and two plays. We will focus on contemporary works from writers who might be considered on the margins of Canadian society and literature. We will consider ways in which these works engage with issues of Canadian identity, representation, culture and society.

This course, together with the required ENGL 220, is one of four 200-level courses that may be taken for an English major with a literature emphasis. Successful completion of ENGL 222 can be used to meet the Canadian literature requirement in the English major with a literature emphasis.
