COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course examines the Common Law and statutory rules that govern commercial transactions. We begin by learning how cases are decided in Common Law courts. Students then examine the elements of contract law to become prudent, moral and ethical contract negotiators. The course also examines the professional liability and fiduciary duties of business persons to their clients and others. Course components include reviewing relevant statutes, analyzing judicial decisions and engaging in critical thinking about legal, moral and ethical problems in business.

COURSE FORMAT

We will use Zoom to have our classes during the scheduled class times. Typically, I will record a 'minilecture' that will be posted to Canvas before the "live" session via Zoom in the Media Gallery that will cover the legal principles in the class. We will spend the "live" class time discussing these legal principles and learning how to apply them to common situations arising in business.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

This course will equip business students with an introduction to the legal environment in which business operates in Canada. By the end of the course students will:

- 1. recognize many of the legal issues they will encounter in business,
- 2. develop strategies to avoid legal problems,
- 3. think critically about legal, moral and ethical issues, and
- 4. develop an understanding of the principles used by the courts to resolve legal issues.

The overall objective of the course is to cultivate and enhance legal, moral and ethical discernment for right action in the business world.

Details of Assessments

The written assignments should be about 4-6 pages long (double spaced). They will involve applying legal principles learned in class and from selected readings to realistic business situations in order to practice reaching well-reasoned, legal, moral and ethical decisions. These assignments will be done individually however it is certainly recommended that you discuss the assignments with your classmates. More information regarding these assignments will be provided in class.

The **Case Presentation** assignment is a group project that involves teaching the class one of the cases on the course outline. I will circulate a case presentation sign- up sheet in class and will provide further information. It is critical that ALL members of your group be involved in the oral presentation aspect of this assignment. The purpose of this assignment is to experience, in your group, understanding of different legal perspectives.

The **final exam** will be similar to assignments #1 and #2 in style and purpose. The final exam is on-line via Canvas, open book, cumulative and 2.5 hours long. Students must get at least 50% on the final exam to pass the course.

To help replicate the classroom experience, make sessions more dynamic and hold each person accountable, both students and instructors are required to have their cameras on during Zoom sessions.
