COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will develop the economic foundations of managerial decision making. It deals with issues that have a profound impact on the success of organizations producing goods or delivering services. Students will learn about, among others, consumer demand, production cost, the demand-supply model, concepts and models related to market structure, product/service pricing with market power, strategic thinking and business strategy, incentives and organization design, decision making under uncertainty, and government policy towards business (including issues related to externality and asymmetric information). Due to the broad nature of the subject, we will focus on the application of concepts and models to managerial decision making that enables an organization to achieve a competitive advantage vis-à-vis its regional/global competitors. Case studies will be conducted, and the applications and examples related to China and global markets will be discussed.

COURSE FORMAT

Class meetings will consist of a combination of lectures, discussions, exercises, and other activities. I will also leave an assignment (a set of problems) for you to complete after the lectures end.

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LEARNING OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the concepts of demand and costs and their applications;
- 2. Describe how the price of a product or service is determined;
- 3. Master the demand-supply model;
- 4. Explain the concepts and models related to market structure;
- 5. Learn the strategic thinking and business strategy;
- 6. Learn about incentives and organization design;
- 7. Explain government policy towards business (including issues related to externality and asymmetric information).

Details of Presentation/Assessments

- (1) There will be a group-based presentation, with each group consisting of 4 students. I'll talk about the presentation in more detail during our first meeting.

- (3) It is also important for your development as a business professional that you be able to verbalize your thoughts and understanding. You will be awarded 20% for attending the classes and actively/constructively contributing to class discussions.

Attendance

Excepting extenuating circumstances, students are expected to attend 100% of their scheduled class hours. Students missing more than 20% of the total scheduled class hours for a course (including classes held during the add/drop period) without having received an academic concession will be withdrawn from that course. Punctuality

Students are expected to arrive for classes and activities on time and fully prepared to engage. Late arrivals may be refused entry at the discretion of the instructor or activity lead. Students arriving later than halfway through a scheduled class will be treated as absent for that class.

Electronic Devices

In-Person Regulations

Devices such as laptops, tablets, and cell phones are not permitted to be used in class unless directed by the instructor for in-class activities. Students who do not follow the School's policy in this regard may be required to leave the room for the remainder of the class, so that they do not distract others. Research shows that students' use of laptops in class has negative implications for the learning environment, including reducing their own grades and the grades of those sitting around them.

On-Line Lecture Regulations

During online lectures, students are not permitted to use any electronic devices other than the primary one used for attending the online lecture (e.g. laptop or desktop). Only Zoom should be open during the online lecture unless an instructor advises the use of another program/website for an in-class activity. Feedback from students indicates that personal devices are the number one distraction from effective learning and participation in the online learning environment.
