

SITES OF SOME INTERESTING BRYOPHYTES OF STANLEY PARK



SITE	BRYOPHYTES OF INTEREST
A	<i>Atrichum</i> is a common moss, but this is a good place to see it
B	<i>Sphagnum</i> – grows in numerous wet places in the park
C	Overtured tree – root is a great place to look at a number of different species
D	<i>Fontinalis antipyretica</i> – aquatic moss (nearby goblin moss on overtured tree)
E	<i>Scapania undulata</i> – aquatic liverwort
F	Old stump with nice <i>Lepidozia reptans</i> (green fuzz)
G	<i>Hylocomium splendens</i> – also nice place to see rhizoids/protonema of <i>Rhizomnium glabrescens</i>
H	<i>Riccardia</i> on wood sculpture
I	Overtured log has lots of mosses including <i>Tetraphis pellucida</i>
J	<i>Leucolepis acanthoneuron</i> – common, but good place to see it
K	Ditch is a good place for <i>Pellia neesiana</i> and a number of haircap mosses
L	The best place in the park to see <i>Schistostega pinnata</i> (goblin gold)
M	<i>Conocephalum salebrosum</i> – in wet depression
N	<i>Cephalozia bicuspidata</i> – with sporophytes
O	<i>Bazzania denudata</i> and <i>Scapania bolanderi</i>
P	<i>Calypogeia azurea</i> – blue liverwort
Q	<i>Fissidens limbatus</i> – pocket moss

Note: * Look for lovely liverwort sporophyte on rotting logs off of Tatlow and Lovers Trails
