Expressing gratitude at the beginning of class for the privilege of learning on the beautiful lands of the Qay'qayt and Musqueam First Nations.

This bonus opportunity expires on the last face-to-face class.

Your mission for this bonus point is to recite every word — without pronunciation error — of our JIBC traditional acknowledgement of gratitude to the Qay'qayt and Musqueam First Nations for the opportunity to learn on their land. In addition to acknowledging gratitude, you will share with those assembled your personally analogy or metaphor for what the word unceded means to you by providing a personally relevant metaphor or action that demonstrates the taking over of a space, property, or land. Here's an example: "When I think of the meaning of the word unceded, I can imagine a scenario where I took over — without negotiating or asking for permission ahead of time — a nearby person's home living room to teach our class because all the classrooms at the JIBC were



booked and I had no other place to teach. That home owner's living room would be unceded — I would have simply took occupancy of the room without permission from or compensation to the home owner. That is what unceded means to me." Note: you cannot use my example for your bonus point but instead must share your original, personal analogy or way of demonstrating the meaning of unceded. Your unceded example can be spoken, acted out in a quick skit, sung, explained in a comic, etc. Be creative!

Part 1: Memorize and recite without looking at any notes:

"The JIBC New Westminster campus is located in unceded Coast Salish territory. In keeping with traditional protocols, we who are assembled here wish to express our gratitude to Qay'qayt (KEE-KYTE) and Musqueam (MUS-KWEE-EM) First Nations who have ties to this territory, and we wish to acknowledge the unceded territory of all Coast Salish Peoples."

Part 2: When I reflect on what the word "unceded" means, this is how I personally relate to it:

More history: The Qayqayt First Nation, is one of the smallest First Nations in Canada and the only one without a land base. The Qayqayt reserve used to exist on the banks of the Fraser River, around New Westminster. The Musqueam people have lived in our present location for thousands of years. Their traditional territory occupies what is now Vancouver and surrounding areas. The name Musqueam relates back to the River Grass, the name of the grass is $m = \theta k^w = y^v$.
