EDCI 591: Ecology, Pedagogy, and Practice July 28th- August 12th at 10:00 am- 12:50 pm Instructor: Dr. Jennifer S. Thom

Course Description:

Today, we are increasingly confronted with issues of globalization, the environmental crisis, and what we "should" do to avoid negative consequences.

Scholars within the Deep Ecology Movement, however, contend that fundamental shifts in the actual manners in which we think are vital if positive, radical and enduring changes are to be achieved.

EDCI 591 is an interdisciplinary graduate course for educators and professionals in leadership roles and is designed for students to explore, examine, and explicate:

- how ecological theories occasion a view that all life is fundamentally one
- how subtle differences in the way we conceive the world engender a natural willingness to care for the world and in turn,
- generate possibilities for redefining who we are, our disciplinary and cultural forms of knowledge and ultimately, the kinds of practices we wish to engage with others.

Course Scope and Events:

EDCI 591 is a theoretical course. Guest lectures by distinguished scholars in Ecophilosophy and Curriculum Theory are planned. Classes, fieldtrips, and required readings draw from the discourses of the Deep Ecology Movement, Systems Theory, Eco-justice, and Cognitive Science.

Course Assignments:

Students will complete one presentation and two written assignments based on the required course readings and classes with a focus on addressing key issues in their specific disciplinary field of research.

This theoretical course, interdisciplinary in its approach to both content and scope, is aimed at attracting the interests of a diverse group of students.
