
G+PS: Changes to Thesis and Dissertations



Higher education and social mobility in Cambodia: Life histories of professionals from poor family origins (Research Sharing Series) March 14, 2018 | Wednesday

Vicheth will present findings of his study that examines the life histories of professionals who are from poor family origins and now hold professional or managerial positions in Phnom Penh, Cambodia. The study adopts a conceptual framework – reflexive practice – that draws on the works of Bourdieu, Archer, and Butler. Data were collected using life-history oriented interviews with professionals working in government ministries, universities, local and international NGOs,foreign embassies, and the private sector in Phnom Penh.

Vicheth Sen is a Ph.D. student in the Department of Educational Studies. His research interests centre around transnational social mobility and social mobility in postconflict/transitional societies, social and cultural contexts of education policy-making, comparative and international education, and adult education and sustainability.

Mapping a Story of Colonial Divisions: Public Mass Gun Violence in the US and the Co-creation of Gunman/Gunboy (Research Sharing Series)

Stephanie's research emerges from a backdrop of a recent increase of public mass gun violence (PMGV) in the United States. In this presentation, Stephanie will speak to:

- PMGV vs. other forms of gun violence
- The demographic makeup of PMGV shooters
- PMGV as a backlash to the nation's "founding" on the violent divisions of colonization, coloniality, slavery, capitalism, and their contemporary patriarchal tributaries
- How we are complicit in the co-creation of gunmen and gunboys through our engagement with state and social institutions

Stephanie Glick is an artist, educator, researcher, and doctoral student in Educational Studies at UBC. Her scholarship explores society's complicity in the co-creation of systemic violence, as well as the possibility of education as means for societal healing through an engagement with an

ecology of knowledges. Stephanie has worked with refugees, cancer survivors and caregivers, women experiencing homelessness, as well as runaway and homeless youth.
