Choosing the right conference(s)...

- Local, regional, national, international
- Prestige value/profile/selectivity
- Primary reason(s) for attending
- Fit with your career/academic plan
- Potential contribution to your social & cultural capital
- Size, location, cost, time away from family/studies, bordercrossing hassles vs. benefits [cost-benefit/return on investment]

Note: Seek advice from peers and faculty who can confirm—or not—your impressions of the value of attending a particular conference (see list).



The "Call for Proposals"...

- Read and follow the guidelines carefully
- Choose the best presentation format for the stage of your work and your goal(s) for attending:
 - ≻Paper
 - ►Panel
 - ≻Symposium
 - ➢Roundtable
 - ➢Poster
 - PechaKucha—20 slides each w/ 20 seconds max. narration
 Others...
- If previous conference proceedings are available, review successful papers and panel/roundtable/poster summaries.



Watch for "types" of proposals...

For example:

- Empirical study
- Model or theory development
- Theorizing from the literature
- Studies on the theory/practice nexus

Note: Watch for conference themes and whether proposals that address the theme will be given priority.

Navigating the conference scene...

- Keep in mind your reasons for attending & be strategic.
- If presenting, learn what you can about the presentation "culture" (norms) of the conference.

➢Read any guidelines provided

- Speak to those who have attended previous conferencesAvoid dramatic deviations from norms BUT be creative!
- Read the program & select sessions to attend.
- Attend some sessions outside of your research area & some that may challenge assumptions or dominant narratives.
- Attend social functions & breaks to network.

Planning your presentation...

- Total time available to YOU
- Ratio of presentation vs. discussion
- Norms & traditions of the conference
- Space & equipment available
- Demonstrating your knowledge & skills; "best practices"
- Flow and pace if others are involved
- Difference/diversity of participants
- Receiving & reacting to feedback.

EDST Graduate Student Travel and Research Presentation Funding Policy

(Approved at Department Meeting – November 20, 2014 with Proviso to Revisit Policy in 2015)

Graduate students are eligible for reimbursement from the *Graduate Student Travel and Research Presentation Fund* once per fiscal year, up to three times per degree program. The Travel and Research Presentation Fund provides travel support to a maximum of \$2,000 per graduate student per degree program. **Applications are accepted year-round until the fund is depleted (the fiscal year is April 1 – March 31).** The Department currently budgets \$20,000 per annum to support students making public presentations of their research at scholarly or professional events.

The presentation of research must take place while the student is enrolled in an EDST graduate degree program. Students must present proof that they have applied for the G+PS Graduate Student Travel Fund and the Faculty of Education, Graduate Student Conference Travel Grant, if eligible. *Students who hold major funding awards that include a dedicated travel budget are not eligible to apply for EDST Graduate Student Travel and Research Presentation funding.*
