About the Student Leadership Conference

The UBC Student Leadership Conference is a student-driven and university supported initiative that provides delegates with a focused, one-day opportunity to develop their skills, establish a solid network of peers and mentors, and discover their leadership potential.

The SLC is the largest leadership event at UBC, and the only leadership conference of its kind in Canada, attracting outstanding students who are leaders both inside and outside the classroom. Since its inception in 2003, the SLC has engaged student leaders from all faculties and years of study. Because of the continued support of students, faculty, and staff, the 2009 conference will draw an estimated 1200 students.

By showcasing meaningful opportunities and connections, the SLC aims to inspire students to act locally for positive global change. Through new project-based workshops, delegates with innovative ideas will have opportunities to meet, share, and discuss how to take substantive action.

Conference Theme: Synergy! Every piece counts... Including yours.

Each year, the SLC Planning Committee has the responsibility to develop a conference theme which embodies leadership. This year's theme is SYNERGY!

Synergy is the idea that every leader is a puzzle piece. In order to achieve their leadership potential, delegates must discover themselves as individual leader 'pieces', and how they fit into the community 'puzzle'. 


Program and Event Maps

Campus overview






Student Union Building (SUB)- Main Floor





Student Union Building (SUB)- Upper Floor



The SLC'09 Keynote Speaker: Dr. Roberta Bondar

Each year, the SLC welcomes a keynote speaker to close the conference with an inspirational, challenging and informative address. This year's keynote is Dr. Roberta Bondar.

As the world's first neurologist in space, Dr. Roberta Bondar is globally recognized for her pioneering contribution in space medicine research. Aboard the Discovery mission STS-42 in 1992, she conducted experiments in the shuttle's first international microgravity laboratory.

For more than a decade, Dr. Bondar headed an international research team at NASA, continuing to find new connections between astronauts recovering from the microgravity of space and neurological illnesses here on Earth, such as stroke and Parkinson's disease. Her techniques have been used in clinical studies at the BI Deaconess Medical Center, a teaching hospital of Harvard Medical School and at the University of New Mexico.

A true renaissance woman, Dr. Bondar is an acclaimed photographer of the natural wonders of our planet. She is the author of four best-selling photo essay books featuring her stunning photography of the Earth. Roberta's photographs of the deserts in the American Southwest and the Canadian Arctic became a well received exhibition entitled The Deserts of North America.

Furthermore, the United Nations Educational. Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) has announced 2008 through 2010 as the International Year of the Planet and Dr. Roberta Bondar has been named the Honorary Patron for Canada.

As a space scientist and neurologist, Dr. Roberta Bondar is a sought-after speaker who makes exciting connections between how our brains adapt in space and how we can adapt to constantly-changing business environments here on Earth. With innovative ideas about how to navigate in uncharted territory, she offers her abilities as a leader and visionary to corporations and organizations throughout North America. Dr. Bondar demonstrates the adaptive thinking necessary for changing perspectives in our contemporary world.

In 2007 the Ontario Government appointed Dr. Bondar as chair of the Working Group on Environmental Education, to strengthen



environmental education in the curriculum of elementary and secondary schools. The Committee presented the report, and all 32 of their recommendations are being implemented in 2008.



Dr. Bondar has been recognized with the NASA Space Medal, inducted into the Canadian Medical Hall of Fame. and into the International Women's Forum Hall of Fame for her pioneering research in space medicine. In addition, she has received 24 honorary doctorates from Canadian and American universities. In 2003, TIME magazine named her among North America's best explorers.

Roberta Bondar's photographic essay books include: Touching the Earth about her astronaut experiences, Passionate Vision ~ Discovering Canada's National Parks and Canada ~ Landscapes of Dreams. Recently published is a catalogue of her desert photography entitled, The Arid Edge of Earth. Currently, Dr. Bondar is in her second term as Chancellor of Trent University in Peterborough, Ontario and she continues photographing the extremes of our planet.

John Madigan: Executive Director, Teligence



Following in the footsteps of his big brother, John also graduated with an Honors Degree in Business Administration from the Wilfrid Laurier University School of Business.

John led the growth of Chromatic Software and spearheaded the development of the company's Interactive Voice Response software solution. With the establishment of the current corporate structure, John now holds the position of Executive Director, from which he is able to support the company with his own successful brand of business and technology-driven acumen.

John has also been recognized for his achievements. He too was awarded the Wilfrid Laurier 75th Anniversary Award for Continued Outstanding Contribution to Life at Laurier. In 2001, John was a recipient of the prestigious Business in Vancouver's Forty Under Forty Award. John, and his wife Lynn, have two children, Julia and Johnnie.

Global Citizenship

Senator Mobina Jaffer: First East Indian BC lawyer, & first Muslim, African & South-Asian Senator



Representing British Columbia, Mobina Jaffer is Canada's first Muslim and Africanborn senator, and first senator of South Asian descent. In 2002, Senator Jaffer was appointed the Special Envoy to the Peace Process in Sudan and is working with Department of Foreign Affairs to aid the people of Sudan in their peace efforts. From 2002 and 2005, she also chaired the Canadian Committee on Women, Peace and Security, and in 2007, became the Deputy Chair of Senate Standing Committee on Human Rights. She took on these roles guided by her belief that the key to peace is the inclusion of women in the peace process as delineated in the United Nations Resolution 1325 (2000). As chair of the Canadian Committee of Women, Peace and Security, Senator Jaffer has held roundtables on racial profiling, finding peaceful solutions to Middle East conflicts, and the plight of

Afghani and Iraqi women. As Canada's Special Envoy for Peace in Sudan, Senator Jaffer has been instrumental in some of the peace initiatives taken in that country.

Dr. Nestor Korchinsky: Past Director of UBC Intramural Sports Program



Nestor graduated from the University of Alberta with a BPE and MA and attended the University of Oregon where he received his Ph.D. He enjoyed an athletic career at the U of A in three varsity sports including basketball, football and swimming. He joined UBC in 1967 in what are now the School of Human Kinetics and the Department of Athletics and

Recreation. Because of his background it was not surprising that he assumed a number of athletic responsibilities, in addition to his teaching duties, as Junior Varsity Basketball and Football Coach and as Assistant Coach for the Thunderbird Football team.

However, in those first years at UBC, the perceived lack of engaged involvement by students left Nestor with the impression that the university lacked, according to him, a soul. He reasoned that if the academic environment gave the



University its character, what was desperately needed was a stronger and more coordinated co-curricular program which would give the university its personality. He concluded that the combination of character and personality would give the university its soul and with it a sense of community spirit and an enduring university tradition.

For 38 years Nestor worked with others to help bring spirit to the campus and the intramural program became part of his plan as did The POINT Newspaper; UBC-TV and Live@UBC. "The challenge for all of us" says Nestor "is to create inviting and enriching curricular and co-curricular learning environments so as to attract and encourage all members of the university to create a community which is vibrant, challenging and fulfilling". In the end, each person is to find their place as a soul seeker and a soul maker.

Dr. Jaymie Matthews: Professor, Department of Physics and Astronomy UBC

Jaymie Matthews is an astro-paparazzo who unveils the hidden lifestyles of stars by eavesdropping on "the music of the spheres." His version of an interstellar iPod is Canada's first space telescope,

MOST (Microvariability & Oscillations of STars), which detects vibrations in the light of ringing stars too subtle to be seen even by the largest telescopes on Earth. Dr. Matthews is the Mission Scientist leading the Canadian Space Agency's MOST project, and an astrophysics professor in the Department of

Physics & Astronomy at the University of British Columbia. Astronomy education and public outreach are also very important facets of Dr. Matthews' scientific career. He sits on the Board of the H.R. MacMillan Space Centre (and was its Vice-President during one term). Dr. Matthews was awarded a 1999 Killam Prize for teaching excellence in the UBC Faculty of Science, as well as the 2002 Teaching Prize of the Canadian Association of Physicists. His media adventures include appearances on CBC, CTV, Global, CNN, CityTV Vancouver and Toronto, and Space: The Imagination Station. He



also posed in multiple guises (from a superhero flying in the ozone layer to an X-ray version of Austin Powers) in the Discovery Channel documentary series "Light: More Than Meets The Eye". He has yet to live down being quoted in Discover Magazine as saying "Exploding Star Contains Atoms from Elvis Presley's Brain - Scientists Confirm the King of Rock & Roll Lived in Another Galaxy 160,000 Years Ago!"


Arts and Culture

Abraham Rogatnick: Accomplished architect, art gallery director, film and theatre actor and producer

Abraham Rogatnick studied architecture at the Harvard Graduate School of Design. Before this, he

had interrupted his undergraduate studies to serve as a soldier during the Second World War. With Alvin Balkind, Abraham established Vancouver's first commercial gallery dedicated to contemporary art, showcasing the work of Jack Shadbolt, Gordon Smith, Lionel Thomas and John Koerner. When he was appointed to UBC School of Architecture, Abraham founded a Study

Abroad Program providing architecture students with the opportunity to learn in cities around the globe. Abraham had served on juries for many Canadian arts competitions and awards, and acted as architectural advisor to the directors of the National Gallery of Canada and the Philadelphia Museum of Fine Art. Throughout his career, Abraham is known to be a speech-maker and lecturer. Soon after retiring as professor emeritus, Abraham initiated a career in acting that would give him more than two dozen roles in productions of theatre, TV videos and films. He is a fellow of Royal Architectural Institute



of Canada, and winner of the Barbara Dalrymple Award for Community Service and the Master Teacher Award. Abraham is fluent in Italian and proficient in several other languages.

Health and Community Development

Dr. Erica Frank: President of American Physicians for Social Responsibility, Founder of Health Sciences Online, former Education Coordinator of WHO

Erica Frank, MD, MPH, is a Tier I Canada Research Chair, a Professor in the School of Population and Public Health and the Department of Family Practice in the Faculty of Medicine at the University

of British Columbia in Vancouver, and a Senior Scholar of the Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research. She is also Founding Director of Health Sciences Online (creating a virtual health sciences university),

President of Physicians for Social Responsibility, and the Research Director for the Annenberg Physician Training Program in Addiction Medicine.

Her major research theme is physicians' personal and clinical prevention habits. She is Principal Investigator of the Women Physicians' Health Study (WPHS), a national questionnaire-based study of 4,501 women M.D.s. and the first large study of their personal and professional characteristics, yielding more than fifty publications. She is also leading an initiative, Health Sciences Online



(www.hso.info), for WHO, World Bank, NATO Science for Peace, the World Medical Association and others. She has traveled and worked in over 60 countries, and is extensively published, including over 100 articles (four of which are first-authored JAMA publications, with additional first-authored articles in the Lancet, BMJ and other major scientific medical journals).

Atila Ozkaplan: Venues & Operations Director, World Fire and Police Games



Sport brought Atila Ozkaplan to UBC from Oakville, Ontario in 1997, after correspondence with former UBC Men's Volleyball Coach, Dale Ohman, convinced Atila that UBC was the right school for him to start his Bachelor of Human Kinetics (B.H.K). Atila followed his B.H.K. with a Master of Science in Exercise Physiology. Atila has used his experiences and education at UBC within several exciting jobs within Sport in Canada. Upon completing his M.Sc. and spending one year as an Associate Student

Recruiter-Advisor at UBC, Atila followed his heart and his passion for sport in Canada by



working for the Canadian Olympic Committee (COC). As a Program Manager, Athlete & Community Relations, Atila counts his experiences working with the COC Athletes' Council, his role as Family Liaison Officer for Team Canada at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Turin, and the acceptance of three proposals that he authored, for additional athlete funding in Canada, as highlights of this role. Atila followed this up with a contract as the Event Coordinator (Burnaby) for the FIFA U-20 World Cup Canada 2007, the most successful FIFA U-20 tournament to date. Atila is currently the Director, Venues and Operations for the 2009 World Police & Fire Games. With an anticipated attendance of over 10,000 participants competing in 66 sports over 40 venues from Pemberton to Chilliwack, this event will be incredible learning opportunity that will add to his experiences in helping define his role as a leader in Sport in Canada.

Jennifer Metcalfe: Executive Director of Prisoners' Legal Services

UBC

Jennifer Metcalfe is the Executive Director of Prisoners' Legal Services, an organization that provides legal assistance to prisoners in British Columbia regarding liberty and human rights issues. She has worked as a lawyer at Prisoners' Legal Services since June 2006. Jennifer majored in Native Studies at Trent University in Peterborough, Ontario where she was a student

activist. She worked on campaigns to free political prisoners and to support First Nations' sovereignty. She edited the student newspaper at Trent University and was involved with the Canadian University Press. After working as a legal editor at a poverty law legal clinic in Toronto, Jennifer moved to Vancouver to attend law school at the University of British Columbia. During law school she coordinated Pro Bono Students Canada and was active in the Environmental Law Group and the Law Students' Legal Advice Program. She articled at Sierra Legal Defence Fund (now Ecojustice) and then worked at a union side labour firm. While living in Vancouver, Jennifer has volunteered for Copwatch, an organization aimed at monitoring police misconduct in the Downtown Eastside, and has served



on the board of an Anarchist foundation. She is currently on the board of directors of the Pivot Legal Society.

The Honourable Hedy Fry: Former Physician and MP for Vancouver Centre



Dr. Hedy Fry has been Member of Parliament for Vancouver-Centre for 15 years. From 1996 to 2002, Dr. Fry served as Secretary of State for Multiculturalism and Status of Women, and currently, she is the Opposition Critic for Canadian Heritage. Before her political career, Dr. Fry practiced family medicine at St. Paul's Hospital in Vancouver and acted as a panelist on the national CBC television program Doctor, Doctor. She has also assumed the positions of President of Vancouver and British Columbia Medical Associations. She studied Masters in humanities at Oxford with full scholarship, and medicine at Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons in Ireland.

Awareness

HIV/ AIDS Global Pandemic Workshop

Andra Dediu and Deb Chen

1st Concurrent Session, 11:15 am - 12:05 pm @ IKBLC Dodson (302)

There are over 30 million people living with HIV globally as of 2007 (UNAIDS Global Report, 2008). Goal 6 of the Millennium Development Goals was "Combat HIV/AIDS, Malaria, and Other Diseases," and it had two targets relating to HIV/AIDS. The first target was to "have halted by 2015 and begun to reverse the spread of HIV/AIDS." The second target was to "achieve, by 2010, universal access to treatment for HIV/AIDS for all those who need it." Neither of these targets have been reached, and they will not be reached by the proposed dates as "tangible support is slow in coming" (UNAIDS Global Report, 2008).

As Vancouverites undergoing a post-secondary education, most of us think that we know a decent amount about the HIV/AIDS epidemic - this is not necessarily true. This workshop will bring awareness to the stigma and cultural issues around the pandemic, how unequal access to public services (healthcare, education, sanitation, and water) affects those infected, and what role you can take to bring our Canadian government to come through on its promised Millennium Development Goals. Most of this workshop consists of a simulation activity which will place participants in roles they likely have never held, which thus leads to a stronger understanding of the pandemic and its effects.

The Climate Challenge and You

If not, what are the alternatives? We will highlight some companies which go further than being sweatfree, by donating the proceeds from some of their products towards African communities.

Going Global: Ethical Implications of Volunteering in Under-resourced Countries

There is a growing concern among some educators at UBC that volunteering in international settings are sometimes less about service and promoting equity and more about self-interest and enhancing resumes. This sentiment was echoed in a recently published (28/09/2008) Maclean's article titled "Helping the world. And Me."

Students are being encouraged to complement their education with service learning and related volunteer activities, particularly if they seek to stand a better chance of being admitted into various professional education programs. For students already enrolled in professional programs, international service learning options are being encouraged. In response, students are enrolling in increasing numbers in both formally established and self-arranged International Service Learning (ISL) projects. ISL opportunities are designed and facilitated by individuals ranging from experienced curricular planners within educational settings to exploitive entrepreneurs with no formal credentials or expertise. Similarly, students can be screened and subject to a wide range of selection criteria and codes of conduct. While some ISL opportunities employ a stringent selection system and a rigorous student orientation/preparatory program, other ISL programs do not regularly review its programs, and expect little of applicants—provided one is willing and able to pay a high "registration fee" to participate. Such poorly regulated and/or for-fee ISL opportunities raise ethical concerns for the individuals and the communities that are impacted as well as for the academic institution(s) to which the student belongs. Since ISL opportunities are often set in vulnerable communities in resource poor settings, the potential for unintentional harm and exploitation exists: such as through the redirection of resources, the refocus of monies and infrastructure to meet the "needs" of ISL participants.

Students will gain a better understanding of where they fit within the team dynamic, and how they can contribute most effectively to completing tasks within a team. Communication is also closely reviewed, and several communication strategies, including the recognition of communication styles, developing assertive language, and understanding the importance of engaging in constructive team meetings, are visited. In addition, students will learn important techniques for managing conflicts within a team, such as identifying the sources of conflict, and distinguishing between interests and positions. By the end of this workshop, students will gain an overall more comprehensive understanding of what a team is and how a team functions, and will also have learned effective teamwork strategies that can be applied to group projects within their undergraduate studies, work lives, or personal endeavors.
