Interactive Oral Structure:

- discussion groups formed by 3-4 students of different topics
- each student leads/facilitates discussion for 7 minutes on his/her topic

Reflective Statement

- Paragraph answering the question: how was your understanding of cultural and contextual considerations of the work developed through the interactive oral?
- > 20 minutes
- To be mailed in to IB

Exploring your topic

- As a group, come up with a few thesis statements about your topic and find textual support to back it up
- Create discussion questions (open-ended!) to be used as prompts in your facilitation of the I.O. discussion

Interactive Oral - Guiding Questions:

- > In what ways do time and place matter to this work?
- > What was easy to understand and what was difficult in relation to social and cultural context and issues?
- > What connections did you find between issues in the work and your own culture(s) and experience?
- What aspects of technique are interesting in the work?

Example

- > Topic: Gender roles
- Thesis statement: Patriarchy is reflected in *Chronicle* through the value placed on Angela's virginity.
- Discussion question: do you feel that the value placed on Angela's virginity suggests a patriarchal society in *Chronicle*? Why? Are there similar values in present day Canadian culture?
