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<u>**Course Description:**</u> This course is designed to enable students to operate with the major sociological concepts and theories within sociological social psychology (SSP). Students will learn to question their everyday perceptions and apply SSP perspective to their everyday interactions. A lot of social phenomena become so familiar that people fail to notice them. This course will provide students with analytical toolbox to make them see what is hidden in plain sight – in the realm of our everyday lives. Students will also learn to distinguish and present theoretical ideas and begin to question their own standing. They will learn to analyze with a critical eye issues raised in class using conceptual and theoretical knowledge gained through application of the class material.

#### Prerequisites and/or Course Restrictions: None

**Format of the Course:** (*This is a brief description of the course format and requirements. Full instructions will be provided in class*). The course will be taught in lecture format with short 10 minutes discussions before each break. Students will be assessed using two assignments (interaction journal and reading critique), midterm and final exams. <u>Note that students will not be allowed to use laptops, tablets, or cell phones in the classroom.</u>

# Assignments

1) **Critique of a Reading (10%).** Each student is required to provide a two-page critique for the reading of their choice (either from the list on a book chapter or the gender readings). These must be submitted **a day before (due midnight)** the lecture where this reading (or chapter) is discussed. Summaries are to be sent electronically to your TA and carbon copied to the instructor. The guidelines will be provided in class.

2) Interaction Journal (20%). Throughout the course (5 weeks in total, excluding the final week), students will keep a journal of their observed everyday interactions. These observations are to be analyzed using the ideas and theories discussed in class. Students are expected to make at least  $\underline{3}$  thoughtful, thorough, and analytical entries per week (each min 1.5 pages long, typed, double spaced). Journals are to be submitted each Tuesday. The guidelines will be provided in class.
