8. **TEACHING**(c) *Areas of special interest and accomplishments*

My basic approach to teaching is Socratic. I have always been committed to having students be actively involved in their own education (cf. UBC's "Flexible Learning" initiative), and one of the best ways to get students involved—and to make sure they understand what is happening—is to ask them questions. I find that consistently involving students in the discussion creates an atmosphere of joint learning that keeps everyone engaged and moving forward.

My linguistics teaching is largely in phonology and phonetics. Additionally, I have been involved in a joint initiative with the Statistics department to offer an introductory statistics course with specific tutorial sections for linguistics and speech science students; a professor in the Statistics department offers the main lectures, and I lead the specialized tutorial sections.

I have been involved in two "Teaching and Learning Enhancement" grants to bring new tools and content to the Linguistics curriculum, with a particular focus on sign language exercises.

Finally, I have been developing (with Kaili Vesik) an approach to exams that involves randomized questions that are made available to students throughout the term. This approach promotes active learning of the concepts and helps all students know how to better prepare for their exams, and will be published in the *Canadian Journal of Linguistics*.

9. SCHOLARLY AND PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES

(a) *Areas of special interest and accomplishments*

My research focuses on the formational patterns of languages (phonology) using techniques from a wide variety of areas, including interactions between phonology and the physical articulation and acoustic or visual properties of formational units (phonetics), the processing of such units in the brain (psycholinguistics), and the use of language to convey social information (sociolinguistics) and meaning (semantics). I am especially interested in how phonological patterns apply and arise in sign languages, where the modality of communication is visual.

Methodologically, I am particularly interested in how phonological categories and processes can be objectively quantified using tools from probability, statistics, and information theory. This has led to the creation of a free, open-source piece of software, *Phonological CorpusTools*, which aids in the replicable quantification of phonological patterns in languages and enables me and other scholars to examine large corpora of phonologically transcribed data. I am currently involved in the development of a companion piece of software, *Sign Language Phonetic Annotator-Analyzer*, to facilitate the transcription and analysis of signed languages.
