### #146 Basant Singh and Harnam Kaur Singh Fellowship

A \$7,700 fellowship is awarded to a full-time student in a Master's or Doctoral program in any discipline, whose work will contribute directly or indirectly to a better understanding and the ultimate advancement of immigrant visible minorities in Canada. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #151 Hong Kong-Canada Business Association Scholarship

A \$4,800 scholarship has been endowed by the Hong Kong-Canada Business Association, Vancouver Section to assist graduate students who have an academic focus on Asia to undertake formal studies or project research in Hong Kong for a period of not less than eight weeks. It is awarded on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #165 Simons Foundation Doctoral Scholarship

Two \$7,250 scholarships have been endowed by The Simons Foundation to encourage women entering doctoral programs. One award is available in the humanities or social sciences and the second in science or applied science. The recipients will be outstanding women scholars with potential for significant contribution to society through achievement in their chosen field. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #357 Walter W Jeffrey Memorial Scholarship

A scholarship of \$1,200 has been endowed by Mrs. Jeffrey and friends in memory of Dr. Jeffrey, an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Forestry, who lost his life in an aircraft accident in August, 1969 while taking part in a water resources study for the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. In recognition of his special interest in forest hydrology, and his devoted efforts in establishing interdisciplinary studies at the University of British Columbia, this scholarship is awarded to a graduate student engaged in interdisciplinary studies related to water resources. In making the award, consideration will be given not only to academic standing, but also to personal qualities, character, interest and promise in interdisciplinary land use research. If in any one year a suitable candidate is not found the scholarship may not be awarded.

### #359 William Rea Fellowship in Television

One or more fellowships totalling \$3,150 are offered by William Rea, Jr., founder of CKNW, in honour of his father, a pioneer Edmonton educator. The minimum value of each award is \$500. The fellowship is open to a University of British Columbia graduate student of either sex, who shows the greatest aptitude in terms of scholarship and extracurricular activity for a career in television through drama, music, writing, photography, engineering or business. The student may attend any recognized graduate school which will further his training in this area, and the scholarship may be renewed for one or more years in appropriate circumstances.

### #430 James Robert Thompson Fellowship

Fellowships totalling \$8,800, have been endowed by the late James Robert Thompson, B.Comm, 1967. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies to students planning a career related to preservation of the natural environment. It was the expressed wish of the donor that recipients of the fellowship would demonstrate a desire to use their talents and abilities to establish a significant career role in preserving the natural and wilderness areas in B.C and the Yukon.

### #472 R E McKechnie Graduate Scholarship

A scholarship of \$2,400 endowed through a bequest from the late Chancellor R. E. McKechnie, is awarded on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies to a deserving graduate student at the University of British Columbia who is proceeding to a M.A. or M.Sc. degree.

### #486 C L Wang Memorial Scholarship

A \$950 scholarship has been endowed in memory of C.L. Wang by family and friends. C. L. Wang, born Wang Chang-Lin in 1902, was the son of a mandarin official in the last Chinese dynasty before the revolution in 1911. He graduated from Tsing Hua University in Beijing in 1921. With a Tsing Hua scholarship, he studied at the University of Chicago completing his B.Com. in Economics. Following graduation, he worked at the Harris Trust Co. in Chicago, and returned to China in 1926. His career in banking spanned nearly four decades. He was the manager and a Director of the Shanghai Commercial Bank until he retired in 1964. He firmly believed in education and encouraged the young not only in the field of economics and banking to which he devoted his life, but also in engineering and medicine. He died a peaceful death in 1987, at the age of 85. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies to a graduate student from the People's Republic of China, with preference given to a student in Commerce and Business Administration, Engineering or Medicine.

### #491 Rick Hansen "Man-In-Motion" Fellowship

Two fellowships of \$16,000 each are offered to physically disabled students enrolled in a full-time graduate program at this University. The awards are made available by the University of British Columbia to honour the incredible determination and many personal achievements of Rick Hansen, B.P.E. 1986 and Doctor of Laws, honoris causa. His two-year world tour, completed in 1987, changed public attitudes and the prospects for the disabled. The fellowship winners are selected by the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies from among nominations received from the Departments of the University.

Rick Hansen was the first student with a physical disability to graduate from physical education at UBC. Physical disabilities can include many conditions and varying levels of impairment. However, the intent of this scholarship is to assist a student who has a physical disability that interferes substantially with their activities on a daily basis.

For this award, we consider individuals with physical disability who:

- have a permanent congenital or acquired condition that results in significant and persistent motor impairments (e.g., paralysis, amputation, mobility problems, serious communication difficulties like aphasia) and/or serious sensory impairments (e.g., blindness, deafness);
- AND who experiences limitations in their participation in everyday activities
- AND who may experience attitudinal and/or environmental barriers that hamper their participation in life
- Are registered with UBC Access and Diversity

Typically, individuals will have physical reliance on a service dog, caregiver, wheelchair or remedial appliance or device.

### #493 Effie I Lefeaux Scholarship in Intellectual Disability

One or more scholarships to a total of \$2,750 are offered to graduate students working in the area of intellectual disabilities. The funds are provided through a bequest from the estate of Effie I. Lefeaux. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #4436 Werner and Hildegard HESSE Fellowship in Ornithology

Fellowships totalling \$35,000 have been endowed through a bequest by Werner Hans Hermann Hesse for graduate students engaged in ornithological research projects, with preference given to those studying wild birds. Werner and Hildegard Hesses' passion for wild birds was sparked in night classes on the ecology and conservation of birds at UBC and led them to become leaders in amateur ornithology. The Hesses conducted bird surveys in the Canadian arctic, compiled BC's Christmas Bird Counts for over 20 years, and developed a special concern for the harmful effects of human development on bird habitats and populations. The Hesses delighted in funding ornithological research and, particularly, contributing to the long-term monitoring of population change in seabirds of the Pacific Coast. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #4811 Westcoast Energy Inc Jack Davis Scholarship in Energy Studies

A \$4,100 scholarship has been endowed by Westcoast Energy Inc. in memory of the Honourable Jack Davis. The award is made to a graduate student in energy studies. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #4817 Wendy Fan Memorial Scholarship

A \$9,050 scholarship has been endowed in memory of Wendy Fan for a student who is entering graduate studies in either Science, Applied Science, Medicine or Commerce and Business Administration. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #4852 Catalyst Paper Corporation Fellowship

Fellowships totalling \$32,300 have been endowed by Catalyst Paper Corporation. The awards are offered to students from Catalyst Paper Corporation operating communities and surrounding areas. Preference will be given to students from communities outside the lower mainland. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6326 C D Howe Graduate Fellowship in Public Policy

A \$14,100 fellowship has been endowed by The C.D. Howe Memorial Foundation and The University of British Columbia. The award is offered to a graduate student in public policy and is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6336 Anne and John Brown Fellowship in Diabetes and Obesity Related Research

Fellowships totalling \$18,800 have been endowed by Ann and John Brown. The awards are offered to graduate students involved in diabetes and obesity related research and are made on the nomination of the Killam Fellowship Committee in the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6362 James and Setsuko Thurlow Scholarship in Disarmament Studies

Scholarships totalling \$5,000 have been endowed by James and Setsuko Thurlow and by The University of British Columbia for graduate students pursuing studies in disarmament or weapons of mass destruction (primarily nuclear weapons). The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6364 Gerhard Henrik Armauer-Hansen Memorial Scholarship

Scholarships totalling \$4,450 have been endowed in memory of Dr. Gerhard Henrik Armauer-Hansen, through a bequest by Mary Armauer-Hansen, for graduate students in the Faculty of Medicine or the Department of Microbiology and Immunology who are pursuing research into Hansen's Disease (leprosy) or other bacterial diseases. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6367 Amanda Araba Ocran Memorial Award

A \$350 award has been endowed by family, friends and colleagues in memory of Amanda Araba Ocran for a graduate student whose research focuses on issues of social justice and racial or economic inequality, or a critical analysis of our society and its socio-economic structures. At the time of her death in 1998, Amanda Ocran was a UBC Ph.D. candidate who was active in the Graduate Student Society, the Student Women's Action Caucus and the Women of Colour Mentoring Network. Her research focused on the exploitation of immigrant home workers as cheap labour. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6391 Michael W. Stahl Memorial Graduate Scholarship

A \$5,000 scholarship is offered by Guenter and Diane Stahl in memory of their son, Michael W. Stahl (March 16, 1969 to November 9, 2005), to a graduate student conducting research in the areas of addiction, depression, or mental illness. In spite of some progress from recently initiated treatment for depression, Michael died after many years of struggling with alcohol and drug addiction. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6451 Pei-Huang Tung and Tan-Wen Tung Graduate Fellowship

Fellowships totalling \$48,400 have been endowed by Mr. Pei-Huang Tung for international graduate students who are citizens of the People's Republic of China or Taiwan. Fellowships may be renewed for a second year of study at UBC subject to recipients maintaining good academic standing. In adjudicating eligibility, the financial circumstances of eligible candidates may be taken into account. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

I am a citizen of PR China and I am studying at UBC on a study permit.

### #6473 Warren George Povey Award in Global Health

Awards totalling \$10,800 have been endowed to graduate students in any discipline who are dedicated to working on global health issues in honour of Dr. Warren George Povey and his contributions in teaching that span over 50 years on every continent and at every level of education from Traditional Birth Attendants in Mozambique to Midwives, Nurses and Physicians and in recent year's graduate students from many disciplines working on global health issues. Dr. Povey is a pioneering scholar in global health and is passionate about addressing the social, political and economic determinants of health and gender equity in the interest of promoting social justice around the world. He pioneered the International Health course at UBC and has also taught global health at University of Washington. The awards are made in consultation with the School of Population and Public Health and the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6475 Ibn Battuta Award for Field Research

A \$3,000 travel award is offered to a graduate student in any field of study who wishes to conduct field research in the following Muslim-majority countries: Afghanistan, Algeria, Comoros, Iraq, Iran, Jordan, Libya, Maldives, Mauritania, Morocco, Palestine, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Syria, Tajikistan, Tunisia, Turkey, Xinjiang (Western China) and Yemen. To be considered, graduate students must have a minimum overall GPA of 80% in their last two years of study. Candidates should also have completed at least one course in field research methods, or be able to demonstrate equivalent knowledge. Award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6495 Andrew Nord Fellowships in Rheumatology

Fellowships totalling \$359,900 have been endowed through a bequest from the Estate of Andrew Nord. Andrew Nord suffered from the effects of arthritis from the age of 15 and the goal for his bequest is "to prevent the disease from its devastating onslaught, to find better ways to live with the disease, and to find the cause, leading to a cure once and for all." Doctoral students engaged in rheumatology research in any faculty at UBC are eligible to apply for the fellowships. Recommendations are made by the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6507 Montalbano Scholars Fellowship

Fellowships of \$10,000 each are offered by John and Dana Montalbano to support PhD students in International Relations or International Law who are recipients of one or more of the following: Four Year Doctoral Fellowship; Killam Doctoral Fellowship; Canadian Institutes of Health Research Doctoral Research Award or Canada Graduate Scholarship; Natural Science and Engineering Council Postgraduate Scholarship or Canada Graduate Scholarship; or Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council Doctoral Fellowship or Canada Graduate Scholarship. Preference will be given to students entering their first year of the PhD program at the University of British Columbia. John Montalbano is an alumnus of UBC, a Leslie Wong Fellow at UBC's Portfolio Management Foundation and a Chartered Financial Analyst. He is CEO of RBC Global Asset Management and Phillips, Hager & North Investment Management, and is responsible for RBC Global Asset Management worldwide. Mr. Montalbano is a trustee of the Killam Trusts, co-chairs the Downtown Eastside Community Arts Fund and he serves on the board of the Take a Hike Youth at Risk Foundation, the board of the Phillips, Hager & North Centre for Financial Research and the Bureau of Asset Management at the University, and is also an advisor to Power To Be Adventure Therapy Society. Provided that a successful candidate continues to meet the eligibility criteria, the fellowship may be renewed for an additional two years. The recommendation is made by the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6509 ORW Opportunities through Rehabilitation and Work Society Graduate Award

A \$3,800 award has been endowed by ORW Opportunities through Rehabilitation and Work Society for a graduate student in any Faculty whose work or research addresses how policy change can reduce or remove barriers to employment and enhance workplace inclusiveness for persons with disabilities. Preference will be given to a student who, in their academic, professional or volunteer work, is helping to effect policy change and advocating workplace inclusiveness. ORW is a non-profit organization that seeks out new and innovative approaches to facilitate change so that there are no barriers designed into employment legislation, policies, regulations and programs for persons with disabilities. Persons with disabilities will have the same flexibilities, opportunities and productive work options as others in the work world. Research or studies that address any disability, including mental health and developmental disability, are eligible. Students from all Faculties are eligible, but preference will be given to students in the Faculty of Arts and the Sauder School of Business. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6511 Shaun Kenneth Gauthier (Shaun G) Scholarship in Cancer Research

Scholarships totalling \$1,400 have been endowed by friends and family of Shaun Gauthier who was a brilliant, intelligent, vibrant young man who touched many lives and had a wonderful enthusiasm for life. Candidates must be focused on cancer research with preference that the scholarships go to students specializing in soft tissue sarcoma, specifically Angiosarcoma. Recommendations will be made by the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6513 Hanson Lau Graduate Research Scholarship

A \$2,550 scholarship has been endowed by Mr. Hanson Lau for a Masters or Doctoral student conducting research into the significant contributions of Chinese immigrants to the Province of BC. Hanson Lau immigrated to Canada from Hong Kong in 1966. He obtained a BA in English Literature in 1970 and a Diploma in Education in 1971 from UBC, where he was involved with the AMS. After teaching briefly in Kitimat, he embarked on a distinguished career in Cantonese radio broadcasting for Vancouver's Chinese community from 1973 to 1998. At the same time, he led several community projects, such as pioneering a 911 phone translation service which earned a federal award, and promoting new citizens participation in voting and politics. Lau has also spent years raising money for local charities, as well as for national and international disaster relief campaigns. He received the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Award in 2012. Lau currently runs Hanson Travel in Richmond. The award is made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6544 Syd Vernon Graduate Student Award

Awards totalling \$12,530 are offered through an endowment established by the Syd Vernon Foundation and administered by the Vancouver Foundation. The Syd Vernon Fund for the Disabled, established in 1989, honours the memory of Sydney Edward Vernon, founder of Auto Marine Electric Ltd and a pioneer of the automotive aftermarket parts industry in Canada. This Fund supports charitable organizations for the betterment of persons with mental, physical or sensory disabilities. The Fund also supports the advancement of education for those persons committed to working with people with disabilities and their families. The awards are available to UBC graduate students who are Canadian citizens, with demonstrated commitment to the disability areas described above, through courses selected, personal experience, past or current employment and/or volunteering that involves working directly with people with developmental disabilities. Minimum individual award is \$2,000 up to a maximum of \$3,500. Awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6588 Rev. Dr. Bernard J. O'Connor Scholarship

Scholarships totalling \$3,000 are offered by the J.D. Ferguson Historical Research Foundation in honor of Fr. Bernie O'Connor, who was a lifelong collector who specialized in the specie of pre-Confederation Canada. The awards are available to graduate students in the second or subsequent year(s) of study whose research or thesis is focused on any one of the following areas of inquiry: monetary history; the history of banks and banking; fine art and money, such as the iconography on coins, medals, and paper money; the history of collections and collecting; the curatorship of coins, medals, tokens, paper money, and other financial instruments; Aboriginal practices of exchange including, but not restricted to, the function and role of trade silver, treaty medals, and the fur trade; numismatics; metallurgy and money. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.

### #6700 Philip A. Jones Fellowship

Fellowships totalling \$17,650 have been made available through an endowment established with a bequest from the Estate of Dr. Philip A. Jones (1924-2015). The fellowships are available to graduate students pursuing research in entomology and/or botany as it relates to agriculture. Dr. Jones was a member of the Royal Canadian Navy Volunteer Reserve during the Second World War and graduated from UBC in 1949 with a Bachelor of Science in Agriculture with a major in Horticulture. He went on to earn a PhD in Entomology with a minor in Plant Ecology from the University of Wisconsin in 1963. Dr. Jones worked as a scientist for Environment Canada from 1977 until his retirement in 1993. The awards are made on the recommendation of the Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies.
