Appearance & Reality re: Justice *How justice appears to most people (Bk 2)*

Appearance is what matters: how you seem on the outside, to others



Order of lives, from best to worst (359a-362c, pp. 37-40)

- Best: be unjust, appear just
- Middle: be just, appear just
- Worst: be just, appear unjust

Reality re: justice What matters is internal structure:

- Justice: each part of state or soul doing its own work
- Injustice: meddling of the parts with the work of the others

What are the "Forms"?

Some quotes:

- Bk 4: 435a-b, p. 121
- Bk 5: 476a-c p. 169, 479a, p. 173

Forms:

- in intelligible realm, not visible: not in space/time
- understood through reason, not senses
- unchanging, eternal, objectively true essences of things such as justice, beauty, goodness



Three couches: Bk 10, 596e-597e, pp. 299-300

Forms as mathematical objects



Objectively, universally true

Geometers and mathematicians "use visible forms and make their arguments about them, although they are not thinking about them, but about those other things that they are like[.] They make their arguments with a view to the square itself and the diagonal itself ..." (Bk 6, 510e, p. 206).
