9. SCHOLARLY AND PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES

(a) Areas of special interest and accomplishments

As a cognitive linguist, my primary research focus is on the advancement of conceptual metaphor theory and methodologies. This goal is realized in four ways:

- 1) Formalizing a model of the relationship between metaphor analysis and frame semantics. The model is compositional, relational, hierarchical, and grounded in an embodied cognitive framework, drawing on insights from Embodied Construction Grammar and cognitive psychology. This aspect of my work is most fully illustrated by contributions to theory (Stickles et al. 2016) and my role as principal investigator of the MetaNet Metaphor Database Project (see Publication Record 7. Other Works). MetaNet, for short, is a cross-linguisic, networked collection of databases comprising a state-of-the-art lexicographic and ontological resource of metaphor analyses. The languages analyzed are English, French, and Spanish.
- 2) Combining corpus linguistics with natural language processing to perform large-scale analyses of expression of metaphor. Traditionally, metaphor analysis can only be done on a relatively small scale, by individual analysts. Improvements in natural language processing technologies, in combination with the development of the MetaNet databases as discussed in (1), have enabled us to find and analyse metaphoric data in much larger corpora, which in turn allows for discovery of microvariation as well as statistical analysis of variation in use frequency (Stickles and Dodge, under review).
- 3) Experimental approaches to the relationship between metaphor, syntax (as understood in a construction grammar framework), and co-speech gesture. Studying metaphor in an experimental setting provides a complement to the corpus and computational linguistic approaches described in (1) and (2). In experimental settings we can control for confounding variables and isolate stimulus effects (Johnstone & Stickles, under review).
- 4) Finally, and perhaps most importantly, I study figurative language and how it can be used (and misused) to influence reasoning and behaviour. To that end, I focus on analysing metaphors in areas of concern to public policy, particularly healthcare, climate change (Johnstone & Stickles, under review), and social inequality. I believe in disseminating research beyond the academy, which is why I am currently coorganizing a conference on climate communication strategies that includes activists, community

organizer, and artists as well as academics (see Scholarly and Professional Activities *f* and Service to the University *a*).

I have worked on MetaNet since its beginning in 2012; in 2019 I became the **principal investigator** and initiated the process of **moving the databases to a permanent home at UBC**.

The MetaNet project seeks to systematically identify and analyze the metaphors that people use to discuss and reason about a broad range of topics and domains. To accomplish these aims, we have developed a multilingual repository of semantic frames and metaphors, including foundational primary metaphors and image schemas; as well as culturally-specific frames metaphors. Metaphors and frames are represented according to contemporary frame semantics and conceptual metaphor theory, which hold that frames and metaphors are compositional and

related to one another via ontological relations such as full and partial inheritance. Details of our work developing the theoretical formal relationships between metaphors can found in Stickles et al. (2016). All data is collected and analyzed by metaphor analysts before it is input into the databases to ensure accuracy; and non-English data is translated and glossed into English. The result is a multilingual network graph database implementation of metaphor theory which is both a lexicographic resource and reference tool for metaphor analysis as well as natural language understanding and corpus processing research.

Previous research focused on documenting metaphors for poverty, gun violence/gun control, drug abuse, and governance. Currently the project is focusing on metaphors for cancer, COVID-19, and climate change. At this time, the databases include coverage as follows:

- Canadian English and American English: 843 frames; 827 metaphors; 7800+ example sentences; 7800+ lexical units
- Canadian and Hexagonal (France) French: 783 frames: 787 metaphors: 1600+ example sentences: 7500+ lexical units
- American and Mexican Spanish: 525 frames; 578 metaphors; 2300+ example sentences; 4200+ lexical units

To date we have identified at least 30 citations using the MetaNet data, and a further 137 citations which cite MetaNet (but do not necessarily make use of the data itself).
