	 class I went back and wrote down the writing prompts at the beginning of class so that the students would be able to keep them in mind by the end of the lesson and have more ideas on what they would want to write about Gave students more choice on what they would want to write about, whatever suits their strengths or challenges them Incorporated group discussion to share any ideas after having written paper as well as let students know that they have the power to change traditions or behaviours in society
