Urban Ethnographic Field School UBC Departments of Anthropology and Sociology

May 11 – June 18, 2015

Vancouver is a city defined by its expanding and deepening connections with societies and cultures from around the world. The dynamic growth of diverse populations reflects the wealth of knowledge and experiences contained in the everyday life of the city. To provide students the unique opportunity to collaborate with and learn from Vancouver's diverse communities, the UBC Departments of Anthropology and Sociology have been jointly conducing the **Urban Ethnographic Field School** (formerly IVEFS) since 2010.

As a fieldwork-based course, the Field School will train students on how to conduct in-depth, community-based research related to the social, political, cultural and economic lives of people from a variety of ethnic and class backgrounds. By immersing themselves in qualitative research, students will gain valuable experience linking hands-on research to theoretical paradigms related to the study of migration, transnationalism, social inequalities, and multicultural communities. Students will learn how to carry out participant observation, interviews, and focus groups; students will also learn how to create descriptive portraits of neighbourhoods and map key community resources, such as sites of worship, cultural centers, immigrant services, language-specific delis and video stores.

Field research projects will be defined in conjunction with community partners that work directly with families, individuals from various backgrounds, and multicultural communities. Students will spend 6-8 hours per week at a local Neighbourhood House or community organization in placements ranging from immigrant seniors' lunch programs to multi-ethnic community gardens to digital stories and photography projects to citizenship and leadership development classes. At the end of the Field School, student research projects will contribute to a public website that will profile "living cultural maps" of Vancouver as a global metropolis. Students will also have the opportunity to publicly present their research findings to participating community organizations at a final event. By fostering research and collaboration with local community organizations, the Field School seeks to build vibrant, lasting and rewarding connections between students, the university and the wider public.

- **Summer Session I:** May 11-June 18, 2015. Class will meet Monday through Thursday, 9:30 AM 12:30 PM at the UBC Learning Exchange (612 Main Street) and students will be expected to complete an additional 6-8 hours of volunteer work per week in an assigned community organization.

- The Field School is a 6-credit course: Once accepted, you will be asked to pay a \$300 student fee in addition to tuition this fee covers the honoraria we pay to community partners, the cost of field trips and guest speakers, and the extra labour involved in organizing a field school. Upon receipt of this fee you may choose to be registered in ANTH 480 and/or SOCI 480 (3 credits of each, or 6 credits of ANTH or SOCI).
